Projects fall under the categories of water supply, sanitation, and hygiene (WASH); productive use of water; and watershed protection. • RAIN: In 2009, The Coca-Cola Company announced a \$30 million commitment over six years to provide access to safe drinking water to communities throughout Africa through its Replenish Africa Initiative (RAIN). Implemented by The Coca-Cola Africa Foundation, RAIN will provide at least 2 million Africans with clean water and sanitation by 2015. • Implementation: RAIN currently supports 42 projects in 30 countries across the African continent and by 2015 will launch over 100 water programs across Africa.

Impact:	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • The Coca-Cola Africa Foundation’s leadership in funding this <i>Water for a Generation</i> project ensures that cost efficient, environmentally friendly, and sustainable technology generate new access to improved drinking water and promote adequate health, hygiene, and sanitation measures. • 287,500 people will benefit from boreholes and solar powered pumps that will provide access to safe, clean drinking water sources. • Improved health, well being, and long-term self sufficiency of communities, health clinics, and schools in rural regions have been ensured through sustainable water and sanitation interventions, affordable infrastructure, and training.
